

















In Memorium

EDWIN P. LAWRENCE III

Born — Nov. 9, 1924 Died — March 20, 1959



The tragic death of Ed Lawrence, charter member of the Oakland County Sportsman's Road Racing Club, took one of the most enthusiastic sports car lovers in the nation from the club rolls. He was chairman of the first Detroit International Auto Show when his life was snuffed out in a spin and fire while taking a practice run for the annual endurance race at Sebring, Fla. It was his first appearance in the big classic and Ed wanted to get the feel of the track and get acquainted with his car when he spun on a hairpin turn with the tragic result. He was one of the prime movers in the organization of the OCSRR and saw one of his lifetime ambitions realized in the construction of the sports car racing strip near Waterford Twp. He is survived by his wife, Joan, and three sons, Mark, 2; Kent, 1; and Scott, five weeks. They are the reason why the OCSRRC has devoted so many hours of hard work to make this show a success. All of the club's profits will be used to set up a trust fund for the youngsters. The OCSRRC hope to get the fund off to a flying start as a memorial to a member who had done so much for them through his years of association with and in developing the sports car racing to its high level in the Detroit area.

OCSRRC Started Nine Months Ago To Give Sports Cars Own Course

The Oakland County Sportsman's Road Racing Club, sponsors of the first Detroit International Auto Show, was organized less than a year ago but already is rated as the most enthusiastic sports car club in the midwest.

It has a membership of more than 225, all interested in competing in the events scheduled for the 1.3 mile strip located on 80 acres of the Oakland County Sportsmen's Club acreage in Temperance Twp. near Waterford and Pontiac.

The Sportsmen's Club was anxious to extend its activities and, after considerable study, decided to invite one of the many sports car groups to lease part of the land with the idea of constructing a racing course.

With such enthusiasts as Bob Gubbins, Lester Smith, the late Ed Lawrence and Harry Barnes back of the plan, it wasn't anytime at all until more than 300 sports car owners and drivers attended a meeting to listen to the preliminary plans.

The Michigan Sports Car Club asked for and was given permission to hold a rally on the turf, making the course as they started the first event. More than 60 cars competed in that event.

Then the Corvette Club of Detroit was given a chance to test the area and see if it was suitable for the construction of a racing course.

All of these preliminaries led to the organization of a loosely knit group that worked together to cut a course out of the 80 acres, digging down to the gravel base and then racing on the strip as it was.

However, this brought complaints about the huge amount of dust being raised by the cars and once again members of the Sportsmen's Club stepped into the situation and suggested the organization of a permanent club. It was started and built up a membership of 225 in a short time.

Then came the matter of asphalting the track and eliminating the complaints about dust.

At this point 16 members formed the Oakland County Sportsman's Road Racing Corporation, a non-profit group, and pledged a total of \$12,000 to get the job done. The corporation is incorporated under the laws of the State of Michigan.

The Corporation agreed to bankroll the necessary improvements with the understanding that the money would be returned as funds were raised from the weekly events and other programs but with a stipulation that no interest would be charged. That's how interested the incorporators were in seeing the project succeed.

Then it elected officers including; President Harry Barnes, Vice President Bob Gubbins, Secretary Dick Norton, Treasurer Anthony Peters and Controller Lester Smith.

The track was paved to a length of 7,510 feet with a width of 12½ feet and members hope to increase it to more than 40 feet wide within the next two years to make it one of the best sports car racing courses east of New York.

The corporation has a lease with the Sportsmen's Club with an option to renew and with the understanding that all improvements revert back to the owners if the lease is ever abandoned.

The course is enclosed with 3600 feet of safety fence, has a specially built judges' stand that is eight feet square and eight feet off the ground and all glass enclosed.

The Road Racing Club sponsors weekly events with runs each Saturday and Sunday and competition every third week.

It is presenting a series of six "On Your Marque" sports car trials during the spring and early summer and then will swing into longer events once the weather breaks and summer has arrived.

The "marque" trials started in mid-March and continued through April with the final two listed for April 25 and 26.

There is a full crew of officials on hand at all times including starter, timers, flagmen and inspectors who keep the course under control and clear whenever an event is underway.

Competition is in six classes and the club has added a new division for modified go-carts for men only. These unique machines, which consist of nothing more than a frame, four wheels, brakes and an engine of the same type as that on a lawn mower, have been clocked at speeds up to 80 miles per hour.

They are the newest sensation in the sports car competition and currently are the biggest thing on the West Coast.

Club officials had numerous requests to stage go-car events and finally gave in after taking a poll of the entire membership.

It is this Road Racing Club that is behind this year's Auto Show. Originally it planned on using the proceeds to improve the course but after the tragic death of charter member Ed Lawrence, members voted unanimously to use all of the profits to set up a trust fund for the three tiny sons of the popular driver.


That's why they have been working so hard to make this show a success—they want to have a good-sized sum to start the fund, for the youngsters are still babies with ages of 2, 1 and five weeks. What better way to use funds than to aid three boys who will never have an opportunity to say they really knew their father—he left them when they were still to young to realize what was happening.







European Cars Jam Auto Show

Economy cars from Europe and one group of models from Japan dominate the first International Auto Show at the State Fair Coliseum, but only one U.S. low-milage machine is in the exhibit that opened yesterday.

The three-day show, hours from noon to midnight, is crowded by so many imports that the single reasonable American facsimile the Lark, is difficult to discover.

The Japanese contribution is the Toyapet. The European exhibit includes the small cars from England, Germany, Italy and Sweden. Sports cars, restored cars and Classics, etc., are other matters. They are all over the Coliseum and the adjoining exhibition buildings. In value there is nothing economical about any of these. They range up to an estimated \$40,000. Judging was to continue today and Sunday.

The exhibition is sponsored by the Oakland County Sportsmen's Road Racing Club, Proceeds go to the widow and family of Ed Lawrence, who was killed at Sebring, Fla., in March, Mrs. Lawrence is assisting at the Coliseum.

4 IMPORTS IN DEBUT HERE

51 Car Makes Will Be Shown

Four new foreign cars will make their Michigan debuts in the first Detroit International Auto Show at the State Fairgrounds on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Sponsored by the nonprofit Oakland County Sportsman's Road Racing Club, the show will contain 51 different automobiles from England, France, West Germany, Italy, Sweden and the United States.

The four making debuts are a Citroen DS 19—the same model used by French President Charles de Gaulle—a DKW Monza coupe, an Auto Union 100 Sp., and an English Morgan 4-4.

Including U.S. sports and standard-sized models and vintage models, more than 150 automobiles will be on display from noon until 11 p.m. each day.

BODY RAISES, LOWERS

The blue and white, fourcylinder Citroen has power brakes and steering, automatic transmission, and an automatic soft-ride mechanism which replaces metal springs and coils and enables the body to be elevated or lowered on the frame to accommodate extra tall or extra short drivers.

In case of a flat tire, the car has a power jack activated by ar instrument panel pushbutton.

The Monza and Auto Union models each have three-cylinder engines and front wheel drives. There are only five other Monzas and one other Auto Union 100 Sp. in the United States.

The hand-built Morgan has an English Ford engine which can power it up to 95 miles an hour. It also has hydraulic brakes and clutch.

PROFITS GO TO WIDOW

A 1948 and 1953 Morgan will take part in the show's vintage car classification.

The club's 225 members will use the show's net proceeds to establish a trust fund for the widow and three children of Ed Lawrence, the show's chairman until he was killed last March 20 during trials for an endurance race at Sebring, Fla.

The show will be staged in the Fairgrounds' Coliseum and Exposition buildings. The club hopes' for a three-day attendance of 30,000.

Auto Show To Honor Dead Racer

More than 200 autos, including 60 foreign-made cars, will be on display Friday, Saturday and Sunday at the State Fairgrounds.

There also will be numerous sports, racing and vintage cars, some dating back to the 1930's.

The occasion is the first annual International Auto Show, sponsored by the Oakland County Sportsmen's Road Racing Club.

The show will be open from noon till 11 p.m. each day.

PROCEEDS WILL GO into a trust fund for the wigow and three small children of Edwin Lawrence, who was injured fatally March 20 when his car crashed and burned during a practice run for the annual endurance race at Sebring, Fla.

Lawrence, a charter member of the club, was chairman of the show when he was killed.

Don Ridler, show manager, said exhibits will include the products of 51 manufacturers in the United States, Japan, Great Britain, Italy, France, Sweden and West Germany, as well as cars owned by club members.

Among the latter is the Maserati in which the late Wilbur Shaw won the Indianapolis 500 races in 1939 and 1940, now owned by Joseph Lawrence, of Wayne.
